RYLA

Juniors completed an application for Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) in January. Students that were interested in attending the four-day camp in Ojai interviewed with Rotarians. Elizabeth Barajas, Joanna Barrios, and Josefina Cruz were selected to participate in the all-expenses-paid camp April 23-26. The activities involved high school juniors from around the county. They were overwhelmed with presentation, activities, and workshops. Developing basic leadership abilities were emphasized while maintaining ethical behavior. Communication skills were enhanced when they discussed the social issues challenging high school students. Learning to solve problems through managing conflicts in a professional manner were taught. Good citizenship in their community through volunteer efforts was encouraged.

The motivational guest speakers inspired these young adults to bring back what they have learned and to share them with the clubs and sport programs that they are involved in. The overall goal is for them to become more effective servant leaders.

Job Shadowing and Service Learning

Every tenth grader, in Child Development and Care, picked a concept and developed a sixty minute, three-part lesson plan: name tags, worksheet and key, along with a game or nutritious snack. Classroom presentations were the first step.

Step two is understanding the real world job skills and expectations so on May 5th, sophomores began two days of job shadowing at local preschools observing teachers.

Step three will be discovering what is involved in a typical day on-the-job working with 2-4 year olds. The next sixteen days, of service learning, will be a balance between students providing service while presenting their thematic lessons. They will write reflections related to the curriculum goals learned in their child development class.

The bottom line is that preschoolers in Santa Paula need the interaction with positive role models and these young adults love the hands on learning experiences. Students that were undecided about working with young kids...definitely know after this community based experience!



Personal Statements

Daniella Martinez, SPHS counselor, introduced the juniors to personal statements using a PowerPoint presentation. It is an opportunity to tell others about their ambitions, personal experiences, and what has inspired them. An outline was developed for two prompts:

- ◆ Describe the world you come from: family, community, or school,
- ◆ Tell us about a personal quality, talent, accomplishment, contribution, or experience.

Oralia Razo, consultant, expanded upon the topic and gave examples, both good and bad, of ones she had read. Students began putting their reflection into sentence format.

Ms. Lamb will finish up the integrated project by sharing her expertise and assisting them in getting each prompt into a 500 word essay format. She will look for sentence structure and grammatical errors.
