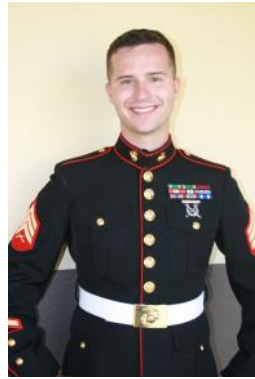
Ronald Reagan Student Leadership Program

With the support of Richard Castaniero, four Human Services Academy juniors participated in the Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation's Summer Leadership Program. The objective was to increase civic engagement of student leaders. They spent five days, in Simi Valley, immersed in Leadership Development Training that focused on three principles of successful leadership:

- ◆ Effective Communication,
- ◆ Optimism, and
- ◆ Informed Decision-Making.

By the end, students were expected to create a Leadership Action Plan to address a problem in their community. They have chosen community service projects in the following areas:

- ◆ Foster Care,
- ◆ Mental Health, and
- ◆ Nutrition.

Pre-Academy Human Services freshmen have been enrolled in Introduction to Human Service class at the honors level. They have a textbook to read at home and nightly assignments.

Section 1 was all about Who Am I? They began by envisioning their future. Aspects as to Why People Work are reviewed since everybody works! Coming up with their Definition of Success lead them into creating a Shield of Success. 9th graders had to draw icons to represent:

Science Labs Raise Awareness

Sophomores participated in a science lab in their Child Development and Care class. The Semi-Permeable Membrane lab had the students making observations and then writing descriptions about what they saw. The baggie simulated the amniotic sac surrounding the baby and the iodine simulated the syphilis germ. They developed correlations at the end of the lab. The conclusion suggested that if the syphilis germ passed over the amniotic sac, the fetus could be born with multiple birth defects. This lab related directly with their Birth Defect Research Projects.
